Here are a few instances of those memories:

1. I had the odd habit of needing to go see movie to relieve some pressure before big exams. Lao Mou was always available to help. While he complained about the possibility of failing the exam he would walk cheerfully with me to downtown Hsinchu, watched a movie, then walked back - an unintentional test of true friendship.

2. We all know that Lao Mou was a great soccer player; he played it with his head, in addition to his feet. He once told me proudly after a CTU inter-department soccer game that he successfully tricked the goalie on the opposite team. That goalie had played on the team representing CTU with Lao Mu many times, and knew that Lao Mou had a great penalty kick to the lower left corner. When Lao Mou was called to make a penalty kick, he first pretended to be staring at the lower left corner then suddenly kicked the ball to the lower right corner while the helpless goalie dived to the lower left corner.

3. Lao Mou is extremely talented in managing factory operations. He was once asked to come out retirement to shake up a weak factory in Texas. He started by showing the supervisor how he can hold meetings with groups of 20-40 workers each time. After each meeting, he would call each worker by name correctly. This demonstrated clearly to all factory workers that no details, large or small, can escape his watchful eyes.
